





*The impressive monogram with inspirational motto "Quo Non Ascendam" a Latin phrase stimulates students' inner capability, their self-confidence and ability to do.*

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
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

- In SSC part-II exam, 209 students appeared. Overall 93% students secured 1st Division and around 70% achieved A1 and A grades.
- In SSC part-I exam, 179 students appeared. 84% students secured 1<sup>st</sup> Division and around 57% clinched A1 and A grades.
- In HSSC part-II exam, 192 students appeared. 82% students secured 1<sup>st</sup> Division and 55% clinched A1 and A grades.



- In HSSC part-I exam, 199 students appeared. 76% students secured 1<sup>st</sup> Division and 52% obtained A1 and A grades.
- In O-Level exam, 27 students appeared. The total number of A1 and A grades are 77. The overall GPA was 4.





Here, I would like to mention that Danish Ali Khan, one of our bright students of Pre-Medical Group, secured 1017 marks in the Board examination. Another bright Hallian, Muhammad Hamza, passed out from Air Force Academy as Aviation Cadet with the coveted Sword of Honour on 9<sup>th</sup> Oct, 2017. In HSSC part-I exam 188 students appeared, 80 secured A1 and A grades while 60 students secured B grades. 175 students were placed in 1st Division and the class GPA remained 4.12.

A total of 167 students appeared in the SSC Part-II exams. 118 students secured A1 and A grades i.e. 70.65 % of the total, which is ever-highest. The overall GPA is 5.01 which is again the ever best, since last three decades. In the SSC part-I exam, 179 students appeared, 145 achieved A1 and A grades whereas 176 students were placed in 1st Division. The class GPA was 5.31. In the



O-level exam 32 students appeared. The number of A1, A and B grades obtained by the students is 188.

Our College teams are geared up to compete with Aitcheson College Lahore, Chand Bagh Cadet College and Cadet College Larkana in the coming days.

### Farewell to 2<sup>nd</sup> Year / A-Levels










### Construction of Residential Colony

## *Celebrating 60 Years of Senior Burn Hall*



## Syed Ahmad Shaheed House (Old St. Gabriel House)



'Fortis in Arduis'  
(Strong in Adversary)

Gabriel, in the Abrahamic religion, is an angel who typically serves as God's messenger. Gabriel is mentioned in Old & New Testaments, as well as in the Holy Quran. In the Old Testament, he appears to the prophet Daniel, explaining Daniel's visions. He was a link between the Supreme Creator and the chosen men; Prophets. He was a messenger of God, when the Prophets used to come in this world.

Owing to the Catholic background of the Fathers, the house was named as St. Gabriel's House. Once the Army took over the administration, the House was renamed as Syed Ahmed Shaheed House. Syed Ahmad Shaheed Bareilvi (1786-1831) was a revolutionary Islamist and a fighter, the Commander of the Battle of Balakot in 1831. He is considered as one of the modern Islamic leaders who led movement that was religious, military and political.

The House, originally established in 1956, was in the main building of school under the supervision of matrons. This building is the classic example of British architecture with wooden upper floor structure. This House is a large, three storeyed building, with hostel facility for the boarders, having capacity of accommodation for more than 150 students along with HM's office, AHMs' rooms, and a well-equipped common room along with other allied facilities.

Motto of the House is '*Fortis in Arduis*', which means 'Strong in Adversary'. The logo of the House had two lions, which were later changed into two cross clubs. This is the representation of Stone Age fighting clubs.

## Shah Ismail Shaheed (Old St. Michael House)



'Sans Peur'  
(Without Fear)

Shah Ismail Shaheed (SIS) House was known as St. Michael House. St. Michael, the Archangel, signifies as a protector and the leader of the Army of God against the forces of evil, who was instrumental in bringing the favour of God on the earth and in the heavens. He has especially been honoured and invoked as a patron and protector by the Church from the time of the Apostles. Although he is always called 'the Archangel', the Greek Fathers, and many others place him over all the angels as Prince of the Seraphim.

Keeping in view the spiritual stature of St. Michael, the House was named after him, which was later on changed as Shah Ismail Shaheed House as soon as the administration of the House was handed over to Pakistan Army by the Fathers.

Shah Ismail Shaheed was an Islamic scholar and a warrior in the jihad proclaimed by Syed Ahmed Shaheed with the support of Pushtoon tribes against the Sikh Kingdom of Punjab. Shah Ismail was a devoted follower and companion of Syed Ahmad Shaheed. He was martyred on May 06, 1831 during a fierce battle at Balakot. Like Syed Ahmad Shaheed, Shah Ismail Shaheed has also shown the path of liberation to the Muslims of India. The motto of the House is 'Sans Peur', which means 'without fear'.

The logo of the House has an axe and a club, which might be a representation of development from Stone Age to the next age. The building of this house is located in the new Academic Block, with the capacity to accommodate more than 150 students along with HM's office, AHMs' rooms, adjacent class rooms and newly established students' mess in its immediate proximity.



Sultan Tipu Shaheed, the Tiger of Mysore, was a capable and innovative ruler and is considered as the pioneer of Rocket Artillery. He continued fighting the British and defeated them in 1783. He was martyred on May 04, 1799, at Sriangapatna, during Fourth Anglo-Mysore War against the forces of the British East India Company, supported by the Marathas and the Nizam of Hyderabad.

Sultan Tipu is held in high esteem due to his heroism, valour and fearlessness. His towering image inspires the young generation. Due to his unparalleled steadfastness and valour against British imperialism, one of the hostels of Burn Hall has been named after him.

Its construction started in 1985, and it was inaugurated by Brigadier Zahoor Ahmad, the Principal of this College, in 1991. 





## *An Interview With Mr. Saadat Abubakar-Hallian from Burn Hall Srinagar*

Burn Hall institutions in Subcontinent started their journey from Baramulla and, later on Srinagar, Summer Capital of the State of Jammu and Kashmir. A mere mention of the word ‘Kashmir’ arouses the feelings of awe, for its magnificent and beautiful landscape, and a profound sense of sympathy and compassion, for indescribable atrocities that the people of Kashmir are sustaining in the hands of Indian Security Forces. So, meeting with an educated youth, who received his education at Burn Hall School, during past traumatic years was a sensational experience. Mr. Saadat Abubakar, a Software Engineer, was on a private visit to Pakistan to meet his relatives. His closed relatives reside in Abbottabad. The name of Burn Hall made him obliged to visit Army Burn Hall College, Abbottabad, on December 05, 2017. Accompanied by one of his cousins, Mr. Abdul Saeed, an Income Tax Official in the town, he met the Principal of the College, Brigadier Wajid Qayyum Paracha, followed by an interview, conducted by the Chief Instructor. The summary of his interview is as follows:-



**Question-1:** *Can you tell us something about Burn Hall School, Srinagar, as it is functioning nowadays?*

**Answer:** Burn Hall School, Srinagar, is run by Missionaries. These missionaries are not from St. Joseph’s Society, known as Mill Hill Fathers, rather local Christians from India. It is a Higher Secondary School, consisting of about 2200 students. In the past, we were told that Burn Hall School used to have boarders, but now it is totally a day-scholars’ institution. As compared to your College, it is a small campus, around 20 Kanals of area.

**Question-2:** *When did you start at Burn Hall School and what level did you attain?*

**Answer:** I started in Nursery and completed my SSC from Burn Hall and did HSSC from another institution.

**Question-3:** *Can you tell us something about your family?*

**Answer:** My father died in 1995. In fact, he was killed by firing of Indian Security Forces, what they named as an ‘accidental firing’. They say, they opened the fire to kill someone else, but my father was hit accidentally. However, our family neither received any regrets from the security forces nor any compensation from the Govt for the great loss of life. My paternal uncle sponsored my education as well as of my sisters. I have three sisters and no brother.



**Question-4:** *What are you doing nowadays?*

Answer: I obtained Software Engineering Degree, but I am running my own business of construction work.

**Question-5:** *Can you share with us some memories of Burn Hall School?*

Answer: It is a wonderful school. Most of the teachers are Muslims, besides Christian, Pundits and Sikhs. Medium of instruction is English. School maintains religious harmony. Since it is a Day-Scholars' institution, students play cricket, football and basketball during games' period during school time. There is no concept of sports fixtures or College Reunions etc. as you have in this College.

**Question-6:** *How do you find our College?*

Answer: It is simply impressive and well maintained College, with magnificent infrastructure. Furthermore, it was really pleasing to see a Kashmir Army Officer doing as Vice Principal. We cannot think of in our part of Kashmir, someone rising to senior ranks, barring a few individuals who can be counted on fingers. You told me that in Azad Kashmir a large number of people are serving in Army and some have even risen to the rank of four stars and three stars. It cannot be dreamt in India, let alone in J&K.

**Question-7:** *Anything you want to say, please feel at home to say?*

Answer: My suggestion is that there should be some interaction between faculty and students of both the institutions if possible. Further, if feasible, some exchange programmes can be extremely helpful to broaden the outlook and world view of the students on both the sides.



## **Beauty is Truth, Truth Beauty**

**“Beauty is truth, truth beauty, that’s all ye know on earth and all ye need to know” (John Keats)**



A number of philosophers, poets and thinkers have defined beauty in their own way, yet there exists such a wide gap between their opinions that one becomes sceptical of all. But scepticism is no conclusion. Needless to say, beauty is identifiable to one’s personal perceptions of it. So, we have no definite definition of beauty.

To some philosophers like Socrates “Beauty is short lived tyranny”. Some, like Tolstoy, declare it a delusion. There are some others who reject physical appearance and consider beauty as something heart-deep. To some people it is facial beauty, which can please each individual. Not only these but there are also several other concepts considering beauty as deception, illusion and happiness. After having gone through all these puzzling descriptions, one is tempted to ask what beauty really is? Could we give a clear definition to this complex and abstract idea, or is it a relative term, defined in terms of being in the eyes of the beholder?

Before coming to a solid conclusion, it is necessary to know what are the constituents of beauty and where do we find beauty? Beauty is present in the face, especially that of a baby. Our mind formulates beautiful ideas and expresses it in the form of creativity. Beauty lies in the eyes of the observer not in the object. It is present in human body. Beauty is there even in lifeless objects, it is present in animals and in natural surroundings. Beauty is there in a big field covered with lush green grass. Beauty is also there in big mountains and small hills. Beauty is there in a small child. Beauty is visible in words and present in deeds. But physically, all these aspects are different from each other. One cannot compare the beauty of mountains to the beauty of women. A child’s beauty lies in the innocence while that of the ocean’s in its depth. Neither could one compare the beauty of a child with the beauty of an ocean.

Now, here we observe what the basic constituents of Beauty are and why man appreciates it. The reason behind this is perhaps that beauty contains harmony, symmetry and proportion and it is indubitable that human beings appreciate symmetry and harmony, even if they cannot create such symmetry and harmony. This is philosophy given by Plato.

It is this sense of symmetry and proportion, which is appreciated by human eye, which in broad term is called Beauty. Here we can sort out the differences between those who deny that beauty exists, like Tolstoy, Socrates and Dante (to these individuals, there cannot exist a perfect harmony. To them symmetry cannot be an exact match to proportion) and who appreciate beauty, those who declare it as happiness, and strongly support that symmetry is possible. Keats in his first poem “Endymion” says,

“A thing of beauty is a joy forever”



It is not easy to see beauty as a joy forever, especially in our day-to-day life because it gradually withers away. The life of a red rose is hardly five to ten days and its physical beauty fades away with the passage of each day. So in such a case, it is difficult to realize that beauty is not a fleeting moment but an eternal bliss. John Keats was a passionate lover of beauty. Beauty is a dominant characteristic of his poetry. Poets have always been the lovers of beauty. But in the poetry of Keats it has been the most dominant theme.

Keats at first is viewed as appreciating beauty in its concrete sense but later his concept of beauty became more intellectual. Instead of worshipping beauty, he began to worship the mighty idea of abstract beauty that appealed to imagination, which in fact passes beyond the world of senses to the world of eternity. Shelley called it “intellectual beauty” in one of his Hymns. Keats has variously described this concept. In his “Ode to Nightingale”, it is merely a song of a nightingale, which enchants his ears, but gradually he escapes into another world where this beauty remains forever, whereas, this song was only a symbol.

An ideal always lives in one’s imagination. Such ideal can be one’s destination or one’s idea about his/her life pattern. Such ideals are not only harmony i.e. symmetry and proportion but also morality, nobility and goodness.

According to T.S Eliot “Poetry is not the assertion of truth but the making of that truth more fully real to us.” To Keats this was revealed in the ‘Ode to Grecian Urn’ that beauty is truth. In this ode, imagination reveals a new aspect of beauty. Beauty, which is higher than the beauty of Cleopatra, profounder than that of heaven, beauty present on the surface of earth i.e. essence of beauty extracted by the imagination out of that fleeting moment which eliminates the beauty, it is that condensed essence which is truth. Human life will go on, people will come and appreciate the beauty present around them but beauty remains there. It does not remain like that ‘Grecian Urn’, but in some other shape.

So, it is an old maxim that when you exclude all the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable, must be the truth. Another important thing to note is that beauty is always appreciated because of its harmony and such a harmony has stability, while stability derives truth. Beauty is truth that stands still and alive forever, and whatever remains forever and unchanged is the truth.

## **Examinaria Studentalis**

The 'exams', what a dreadful word for learners, and students have ever heard in their life, rather it will be more appropriate to say that the word 'exam' is such an indigestible food item that needs a strong digestive system supplemented with group of carminative manufactured by well renowned, skilled and certified pharmaceutical industries.

The, 'Examinaria studentalis', is one of epidemic disease related to the exams, which is the root cause of this disease. ## **The Holy Quran & Biological Sciences**

For many centuries, humankind was unable to study certain data contained in the verses of the Quran because they did not possess sufficient scientific means. It is only today that numerous verses of the Quran dealing with natural phenomena have become comprehensible. A reading of old commentaries on the Quran, however, knowledgeable their authors may have been in their day, bears solemn witness to a total inability to grasp the depth of meaning in such verses. In the 21<sup>st</sup> century, with its compartmentalization of ever-increasing knowledge, it is still not easy for the average scientist to understand everything he reads in the Quran on such subjects, without having recourse to specialized research. This means that to understand all such verses of the Quran, one is nowadays required to have an absolutely encyclopedic knowledge embracing many scientific disciplines.

In fact it is only in modern times that scientific progress has made the hidden meaning of some Quranic verses comprehensible to us. In the case of a verse in chapter Al-Ambiyaa

**“Do the unbelievers not realize that the heavens and the earth were joined together, then I clove them asunder and I made every living thing out of water. Will they still not believe?” (21:30)**

This is a dramatic affirmation of the modern idea that the origin of life is aquatic.

Progress in Botany at the time of Muhammad (S.A.W) was not advanced enough in any country for scientists to know that plants have both male and female parts. We may read the following in the chapter TaaHaa:

**“(God is the One who) sent down rain from the sky and with it brought forth a variety of plants in pairs.” (20:53)**

Today we know that fruit comes from plants that have gender characteristics even when they come from unfertilised flowers, like bananas. In the chapter Ar-Raad we read the following:

**“... and of all fruit (God) placed (on the earth) two pairs.” (13:3)**

When we look in the field of physiology we come to know that one thousand years before the discovery of the blood circulatory system, and roughly thirteen centuries before it was determined that the internal organs were nourished by the process of digestion. A verse from chapter An-Nahal described the source of the constituents of milk, in conformity with scientific facts.

**“Verily, in cattle there is a lesson for you. I give you drink from their insides, coming from a conjunction between the digested contents ( of the intestines) and the blood, milk pure and pleasant for those who drink it.” (16:66)**



This very precise concept is the result of the discoveries made in chemistry and physiology of the digestive system over one thousand years after the time of Prophet Muhammad (S.A.W).

There are a multitude of statements in the Quran on the subject of human life, which constitute a challenge to the embryologist seeking a human explanation for them. It was impossible for a human being living in the early seventh century to have accurately expressed such ideas.

In chapter Al-Insaan the Quran states:

Biodiversity is the disparity, difference and multiplicity of the living beings on the earth. There is a variety of plants, animals, and bacterial, fungal and viral micro organisms as well as Protista in the animal field. The verses of the Quran make mention of the following animals: camels, mosquitoes, spiders, bees, snakes, locusts, horses, mules, donkeys, serpents, pigs, mounts, the beast of the earth, birds, sheep, frogs, cattle, crows, monkeys, lice, dogs, pearls, molars, hoopoes etc.

In the botanical field, the verses of the Quran make mention of the following plants: grass, tamarisk, onions, legumes, figs, mustard, pomegranate, ears, trees, sheaths, spathes, lentils, clusters, husks, grapes, fruits, garlics, cucumbers, pellicles, camphor, date stones, pumpkins etc.

The verses of the Quran refer to the animal, botanical and human variations like wools, fibres and hairs. We read:

**“And out of their wool, and their soft fibres (between wool and hair), and their hair, rich stuff and articles of convenience (to serve you) for a time.” (An-Nahl 16:80)**

The verses of the Quran also handle their manners of walking. We read:

**“Allah has created every creature from water. And of them are those that move on their bellies, and of them are those that walk on two legs, and of them are those that walk on four. Allah creates what He wills. Indeed, Allah is over all things competent.” (An-Nur 24:45)**

The fact that we possess the mummy of this Pharaoh is one of paramount importance. The Quran, in chapter Yunus, notes that the body of the Pharaoh would be saved from the waters:

**“Today I will save your dead body so that you may be a sign for those who come after you.” (10:92)**

A medical examination of this mummy has shown that the body could not have stayed in the water for long, because it does not show signs of deterioration due to prolonged submersion. Here again, the comparison between the narration in the Quran and the data provided by modern knowledge does not give rise to the slightest objection from a scientific point of view.

A totally objective examination of the Quran, in the light of modern knowledge, makes us deem it quite unthinkable for a man of Muhammad’s time to have been the author of such statements, on account of the state of knowledge in his day. Such considerations are part of what gives the Quranic revelation its unique place among religious and non-religious texts, and forces the impartial scientist to admit his inability to provide an explanation based solely upon materialistic reasoning.

Such facts are challenge to human explanation leaving only one alternative:

**“The Quran is undoubtedly a revelation and gift from God”**

“The worst sin towards our fellow creatures is not to hate them, but to be indifferent to them; that’s the essence of inhumanity.” [George Bernard Shaw]

Life is sensitivity. The lowest life is sensitive only to itself; it does not care. The highest we come in the scale of existence, the higher the range of sensitivity and the deeper the depth of caring we find.

We can judge how far we have risen in the scale of life by asking one question: How widely and how deeply am I sensitized? How widely and how deeply do I care? The extent of the elevation of an animal and, of course, any rational being, can be measured by the degree to which sacrificial love for others controls that being. If little sacrificial love controls that being, the life is low: if more, the life is higher. Not how cultured, how rich, how educated, how highly-born we are, but how much sacrificial love we have for others, determines how higher in the scale of existence we are.

Our compassion for others seems to be directly correlated to whether people are close to us socially, emotionally, culturally, ethnically, economically and geographically. Some people are sensitized only to themselves. They live in a state of self-reference. “How will that affect me?” is their first reaction. In a railway wreck, people were pulling out the dead and dying, a woman sat on her suitcase, swaying back and forth in agony, and saying, “Oh, my new pair of shoes. I’ll make the railway pay for them.” She didn’t know it, but she revealed she was low down in the scale of existence – her mind was on her shoes. Then there are those who are sensitized to their family: they live in a state of family reference. Similarly, children and teens often have a great deal of empathy for their close friends and family, but it is often harder to truly value those outside this circle of concern, especially those who are different, such as a new student in class, someone who speaks a different language or even someone who dresses differently from them – they are a little higher in the scale of existence but not much.

Some are sensitized to their class. They live in a state of class reference. They reveal their level of development. Then there are those who are sensitized to their race. They feel race pain not human pain. Then there are those who are sensitized to a person as a person- apart from race and birth and colour and class. In the highest realm of human living there are those who are sensitized even to their enemies.

The future of the world is in the hands of those who care, not on a limited scale – myself, my family, my class, my race, my party – but in the hands of those who care with unlimited caring.

Students can demonstrate caring, by doing small nice things. For example, if someone has gone for few days, offer to help him get caught up and sharing your notes with him can make a



difference. Nevertheless, to help someone cheat is no way caring or helping rather, it is appreciable to help a classmate, if he needs help understanding a specific subject.

Teachers are also effective when they deeply care about the learning of each student. When students know that their teachers genuinely care, they respond by exerting greater effort to reach their potential. The educators bear a special responsibility to train the young generation to become helpful to everyone and have deep affection for the hungry, the thirsty, the diseased, the homeless and the lonely ones. It takes courage to be called ‘caring’, because people who care run the risk of being hurt. It is not easy to let our guard down, open our heart, react with sympathy or compassion or indignation or enthusiasm, when usually it’s much easier and sometimes much safer not to get involved. To care, we have to surrender the armour of indifference. We have to be willing to act, to make the first move. People who take the risk make a tremendous discovery: The more things we care about, and the more intensely we care, the more alive we are. As we begin to care, we begin to share: and as we begin to share, we begin to love. So the greatest development in life is a development in caring, in sharing, in loving.

We must pray this little prayer everyday: ‘Let our hearts be broken by the suffering and pain around us.’ This prayer is a crying out to God, that God would break our hearts yet again and again, so that we may love other people, the way God does. No man or woman can, unless God breaks that individual’s heart. Only then can he or she – or we – care and love as He loves. That’s why we must pray constantly that God will soften our hearts so we see the world the way He sees it.

May we generously share the gift of caring with our fellow human beings and make this world a better place to live in. May God bless us to reach out our hand to comfort others and transform their pain into joy. It does not need a lot of money, but it needs a heart full of compassion. Don’t wait for the time to do big things. Start with little acts of kindness to make a difference. As Mother Teresa said, “We can do no great things, only small things with great love.”

### First Impressions


